TITLE OF REPORT: UK Shared Prosperity Fund (UKSPF) Gateshead Community Chest Fund

REPORT OF: Colin Huntington, Strategic Director, Housing, Environment and Healthy Communities

Purpose of the Report

1. To inform Cabinet of the recommendations of the UKSPF Gateshead Community Chest Fund Panel.

Background -

- 2. The UK Shared Prosperity Fund is a central pillar of the UK government's Levelling Up agenda and provides £2.6 billion of funding for local investment by March 2025. The Fund aims to improve pride in place and increase life chances across the UK investing in communities and place, supporting local business, and people and skills.
- 3. The Community Chest Programme aims to support voluntary, community and social enterprise sector organisations, based or working in Gateshead to develop and deliver new or enhanced activities and projects. Projects must address the key objectives of the Council's Thrive agenda and the Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.
- 4. Following consultation with Legal, Procurement and the External Funding Project Team, the Community Foundation were appointed to manage the funding process. As part of the process, the Foundation presented suitable applications from eligible groups to an independent panel of Council representatives and stakeholders to make recommendations on which projects should be funded.

Proposal

- 5. The total recommended funding allocated during the UKSPF Panel meeting was £325,753. If approved the funds will be distributed to 28 successful groups in the first week of April 2024. Some of the groups who have been recommended for funding will receive extra conditions which will be stated clearly in the offer agreements. See appendix 2 for the list of accepted and rejected projects.
- 6. On approval of the recommendations, a single transaction via the Agresso system will release the money to the Community Foundation. The Foundation will then distribute the funding subject to the organisations agreeing to the terms and conditions contained in an offer letter. The Foundation will receive a 7% levy of for their work associated with the grant approval process

(£22,802.71). Groups can then begin to deliver the projects that they have proposed.

Recommendations

- 7. It is recommended that Cabinet:
 - (i) supports the recommendations of the UKSPF Community Fund Panel; and
 - (ii) approves the transfer of £348,555.71 to The Community Foundation to distribute the funding, subject to the successful organisations agreeing to the terms and conditions contained in an offer letter.

For the following reasons:

- (i) The UKSPF Panel and Culture, Sport and Leisure Portfolio agree that the recommendations meet the funding criteria and will benefit the residents of Gateshead.
- (ii) Release of the money will allow projects to start and spend the Levelling Up Money allocated to this funding project.

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Policy Context

- Gateshead Council's Community Chest Grant Programme is an open bidding grant fund administered on behalf of the Council by the Community Foundation. The fund allows Voluntary Community Sector (VCS) organisations to apply for grants of up to £10,000 to create and deliver their own project activity which meets the needs of their specific locality. Groups could also apply for up to £20,000 to undertake feasibility studies.
- 2. The Community Chest Programme aims to support organisations to develop and deliver new or enhanced activities and projects addressing the key objectives of the Council's Thrive agenda and the Government's Shared Prosperity Fund.

Background

- 3. The primary goal of UKSPF is to *build pride in place* and increase life chances across the UK. This fund replaces a range of grant funded programmes including European Social Funding (ESF) and European Regional Development Fund (ERDF). The funding is an opportunity to boost productivity and enhance employment opportunities, tackle inequalities, and deliver real change for Gateshead's communities, places, people, and businesses.
- 4. The UKSPF Community Chest Fund opened to applications on the 8th November and closed on the 18th December. The Community Foundation assessed 71 applications and presented a selection of high, medium and low priority projects to the UKSPF Panel on the 12th February.
- 5. A free webinar was held on the 24th November in order to provide information and advice to groups with an interest in applying for the fund. Over 64 groups logged in to the webinar. The Council's Locality Team and Connected Voice then provided support to any groups who required further advice.
- 6. Applicants had to be voluntary, community and social enterprise sector organisations, based or working in Gateshead. Organisations with an annual income of over £250,000 were required to provide an explanation of why the requested funding cannot be sought, either in whole or in part, from their unrestricted reserves or other alternative sources.
- 7. Examples of eligible organisations included:
 - Constituted voluntary or community organisations
 - Registered charities including charitable companies
 - Social enterprises, for example, Community Investment Companies and Co-operatives

In order to be eligible, non-charity social enterprises had to provide a plan explaining how the organisation is, or aims to be, financially resilient with trading as a core part of its income.

8. The UKSPF Community Chest Fund Programme **<u>does not</u>** fund:

- Contributions to general appeals or circulars
- Routine building or equipment repairs and maintenance
- Activities which have already taken place/retrospective funding
- Privately owned and profit-distributing companies or limited partnerships
- Organisations with unrestricted reserves that exceed one year's running costs
- Individuals
- Activities where the primary benefit is the advancement of religion
- Activities where the primary benefit is to enable a public body to carry out its statutory obligations
- Activities where the primary benefit is the advancement of animal welfare
- Grant-making or equivalent gifts in kind by other organisations (although we can fund provision of necessary goods for a service e.g., food parcels or activity packs)

Consultation

- 9. The UKSPF Community Chest Fund Panel was chaired on 12th February by Deputy Leader Councillor Donovan. The chair was joined by Councillor Kirton, Councillor Walker, External Funding Programme Manager Rachael Crooks, Localities Strategic Lead Peter Allen and Deputy Chief Executive of Connected Voice Giovanni Spatuzzi. Also in attendance to provide support to the panel was Adam Lopardo, Nils Stronach, Jo Cundall, Pete Barrett, Ged Robinson from the Community Foundation and Andrew Yates from the Council's Locality Team.
- 10. The Community Foundation presented all high and medium priority applications to the panel with discussion taking place around suitability and scope. Projects that did not meet the criteria, or duplicated existing work were rejected.
- 11. Each panel member received a report from the Foundation on the high and medium priority applications a week before the meeting. The report contained information on the strength of the organisations and the staff from the Foundation were able to answer specific question about the projects during the panel meeting as they had conducted visits and interviews as part of the report process to complement the desk top exercise carried out to determine suitability.
- 12. The UKSPF Panel's recommendations were presented to Culture, Sport and Leisure Portfolio on the 19th February. Portfolio supported the panel's recommendations.

Alternative Options

13. The funding could be reallocated to another one of the Council's UKSPF investment priorities. The March 2025 deadline for spending the money would make this a potentially difficult option.

Implications of Recommended Option

14. Resources:
